

EXHIBITION DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The exhibition 'Close Up – Inorganic Subject' was challenging for many members, however a total of 72 entries were received for consideration. Returning judge Kim McAvoy grappled with a few issues on the WCC website following the implementation of the WAPJA scoring system this year. As a result, quite a number of images were rescored on the night and corrected scores updated onto the website that evening. Apologies for any inconvenience on the night, next month will be smoother!

Kim's comments on images were positive and encouraging, with helpful and informative tips. A recurring response was to work on the story telling effort, to determine the main subject in your image and ensure it is clear, sharp, has good clarity and contrast and draws the viewer's eye.

Theresa Pitter leads the point score with a Gold for *Put Your Left Leg Out and Shake it all About,* Silver for *Urban Decay* and two Bronze awards. **Chris Hawkins** followed with Gold for *Exploring*.

Mal Guy has given us an indication of his abilities by submitting three images as a Novice and winning two Silver (*That Moment* and *Tefal Frypan*) and one Bronze award. Well done, Mal. You have already moved on from Novice!

Ian Gordon won two Silver awards, for *Forever is finite..* and *Pilbara Tree*, while **Nola Sumner** also won Silver for *Builders Nightmare* and *Above the Rest*.

Gregory Bell received Silver for *mechanism* (carbon transfer print) and **Ian Sampson** also won Silver for Light and shadow wcc.

Other Silver award winners were **Georgina Wilson** (*Young snow monkey*), **Catherine Williams** (*Show off*), **Phil Arntzen** (*Stylus*) and **Rob McKrill** (*three taps*).

3% of entries received Gold, followed by 18% for Silver and 33% receiving Bronze.





CALLING ALL PHOTOGRAPHERS – MACRO INFO by Bob Halligan

We have a PhotoMarket on Sunday Feb 24. Absolutely anything in the way of equipment might appear at the Market, but not every time.

Which is not a problem if you come to every one. Lots of people do that. Having said that, I can tell you that some items ALWAYS turn up and these include: close-up lenses, reversing rings, extension tubes, bellows attachments, focusing slides, macro lenses (if you are lucky), lights, flashguns, reflectors and tripods. Do we ever have tripods!

And this is the point. If you were paying attention the other night when Kim, Phil and Keith were telling us how to make Macro pictures, you already know that my list includes just about everything you might need to do the job. Look out especially for old film camera lenses, because most of the time for close up work you will be using Manual mode on your gee-whiz new camera, so it makes no difference how old the glass is on the front.

And it will be on sale for peanuts! So bring along your camera to make sure that everything fits.

The Porongurups and Stirling Ranges - By Jim Lewis

I must say that this is one of our favourite places to visit for a break – an away from it all holiday. I had been to Mt Barker and beyond on the Albany Hwy, but never turned off to visit this area until a few years ago. Although this trip was in December, which was later than we had intended, and we were dismayed to see the landscape so dry all the way down, once we reached the Porongurup region we were pleased to see a change in the scenery and a bit of spring preserved! There were still some wildflowers about and parent birds feeding their babies.



We stayed at Porongurup Range Tourist Park, a very nice campsite, clean and very well maintained by the owners, who are happy to tell you all the best walks in the region. It is also very centrally located. There is also Karribank next door for more variety in cabins for those not wanting to camp, plus other places in the area. The region is a landscape photographers dream.



You can do a quick run around the Porongurup Range in the car to get the best angles of sunlight, morning and evening. Apart from the well-known Granite Skywalk at Castle Rock, there are plenty of walk trails for all sorts of fitness levels.

We like the Nancy's Peak and Devil's Slide walks. There is now a new walk trail from the Castle Rock car park.

Go past the toilets and take the right hand trail. You will see the information signs with local birds identified. Some pictures by our own Keith Lightbody! This is quite an easy walk and you don't really need to go all the way around to see birds. There were splendid fairy wrens and red winged fairy wrens as soon as you got to the trees, then yellow robins, to mention just a few.



My personal recommendation for gear: If you do Nancy's Peak, Devil's Slide or any big walks like that, don't take too

much gear. I only used my 24-70 with macro. Although you might well see a few wedge-tail eagles up there, you are better off taking an extra water bottle. The first walk and lower areas are great for big lens users; even around the car park areas you can see a variety of birds. Twin Peaks Reserve is quite flat and you'll see wedge-tails and raptors there.

It is not far to drive to the Stirling Ranges from the Porongorup and well worth it. We didn't do Bluff Knoll this time but did drive



through the National Park on Stirling Range Drive, an unsealed road but OK for 2wd (some sections are very corrugated but mostly fine). Just before that we called in to Moingup Springs, a small camping area just off the main road. I got a shot of a golden whistler there!

To sum it up, for a 4 hour drive from Perth, you could be in Tasmania!



This is great for a stand-alone trip or a stop on the way to Albany and Denmark. Best time would be spring to get the best of the wildflowers. Take a variety of clothing as the weather can change suddenly.



WCC LIBRARY Elise and Gary Jones



This month we have a brief comparison of two books on Lightroom.

According to a review on Book Depository, "Adobe's Lightroom has emerged as a must-have software due to its powerful editing tools and time saving organizational capabilities but how you establish a personalized, creative workflow that optimizes this technology, your time, and your art eludes most photographers." As newcomers to Lightroom, establishing a personalized, creative workflow is presently uppermost in our minds also.



"How Do I Do That in 2nd Lightroom Classic Edition" by Scott Kelby: This slim, compact book recommended was bv Judith Shields as a good starter book on Lightroom. It certainly is easy to read, to learn the basic features. However, being compact, it lacks a lot of the more advanced features and tricks of Lightroom. Unfortunately, it becomes


necessary to progress to other books for these!

"Creative Workflow in Lightroom" by Jason Bradley: Jason Bradley is an award-winning photographer and pro-user of Lightroom. He shares his own ideas on creative workflow in Lightroom, with a practical and

easy to follow guide that summarises the "how" and the "why" of a professional photographer's creative workflow.

This book also uses lots of photos and screen prints to support the text.

Jason has somewhat different ideas to Scott, e.g. on how to manage the balance between



contrast and clarity, or on the relative merits and best use of the tone curve, or the virtues of the TAT (Targeted Adjustment Tool) in the HSL Panel. Much more, besides!

It seems to us that the latter two books are complementary, because the somewhat different ideas are great food for thought in developing your own style.
